

Declaration of Independence

- Written by Thomas
 Jefferson
- Adopted, or accepted by vote, on <u>July 4, 1776</u> in Philadelphia, PA during 2nd Continental Congress
- It has four main sections which discuss all the issues between the 13 Colonies and Great Britain.

Part 1: Preamble (Introduction)

- The document begins by saying that when one groups separates from another, an explanation should be given.
- WRITING down the colonies intentions of separating from England will give them a good place to start new.

Part 2: Principles and Beliefs

- All men are created equal
- All people have certain rights that no one can take away:
 These rights come from God
- These rights are: "life, liberty, and pursuit of happiness"
- Government is created by people to protect these rights and that government gets its power from the people it governs
- If a government doesn't protect these rights then the people have the right to change that government.
